If you are feeding stray or feral cats in Marion County, you are required by the city's TNR ordinance to spay/neuter, vaccinate, and eartip for identification all the cats in your colony (group) and be registered with IndyFeral.

Both **Feral Bureau of Indiana** and **IndyFeral** offer training and education for caregivers of stray and feral cats. These services are provided to ensure the safe trapping, transport and management of the cats in an effort to stop their uncontrolled population growth, improve the lives of the cats, minimize nuisance behavior and ensure ordinance compliance.

Lost and Found

Lost a pet?

- Review “lost dog and cat behavior”: visit www.movetoact.org click on “articles” / “animal behavior.”
- Thoroughly search the area where the pet was lost, including woods and hiding areas.
- Ask neighbors, delivery persons (mail carrier, UPS/FedEx drivers) and children to be on the lookout and contact you if seen.
- Post colorful flyers in the neighborhood, gas stations and veterinarian offices. Design with BIG PRINT so as to be readable from cars. Include basic info, description, contact phone numbers.
- Animals often travel back to their old neighborhoods. If you’ve moved, post flyers there, too.
- Post on your Facebook.
- Put a “lost” ad in the newspaper.
- File a lost/found report provided at the Humane Society of Indianapolis

- Visit local shelters daily. Look in the kennels yourself. Do not take staff’s word that your animal is not there. Stray animals are received daily and are to be held

for a mandatory four days at Animal Care and Control. Strays are then either put up for adoption, sent away with an animal rescue organization, or eventually killed to make room for incoming animals.

 - Do not forget to search the surrounding county shelters as well. Animals travel.

Found a friendly dog or cat?

- Per Section 531-201 (a)...*Persons finding a stray animal are to notify the animal care and control division within forty-eight (48) hours. At the discretion of the division, the animal may be kept by the finder and a found report left with the division, to enable the finder an opportunity to return the animal to its rightful owner.*
- Do NOT take the animal to Animal Care and Control. There is a high likelihood that it will be killed to make room for incoming animals or become infected with a shelter-borne disease and die before it is re-homed.
- If the animal has ID tag – contact the owner.
- If no ID tag – take to a local veterinarian office to have scanned for a microchip. This is free.

- If no tag or chip ID and you take the dog or cat into your home – notify the databases and post colorful flyers in your neighborhood with the animal’s description and your contact number.
 - Take a dog for a walk in the area where it was found. Often it will lead you to its home.
 - Ask people walking their dogs if they have seen this (found) dog.
 - Put a found ad in the newspaper.
 - File a Lost/Found report provide by the Humane Society of Indianapolis http://indyhumane.org/uploads/resources/lost-found_pet_report.pdf
 - Post on your Facebook.
 - Post online at these resources:

 - If you choose to keep the dog or cat, good for you!
 - If you choose to re-home the animal yourself, contact family, friends, relatives, neighbors and coworkers. You can profile the dog or cat on Petfinder with the help of a rescue group.
 - Contact every rescue organization you can. Rescue organizations can be found in publications at most doggie day care facilities, doggie bakeries, grooming shops, many veterinarian offices and most pet-related businesses.

Spotted an unfriendly dog?

- The dog may be lost and/or scared. Report the dog sighting to Animal Control. Review the “lost dog” ads in the newspaper and be alert to flyers with that dog’s description.

Spotted or found a stray cat?

- The cat may be lost and/or scared. You can report the cat sighting to Animal Control. Review the “lost cat” ads in the newspaper and be alert to flyers with that cat’s description.
- If you can’t find its home by the methods described above for dogs you can give it a home yourself or find it a home. If you can’t provide or find it a home, contact:

Reward-Based Behavior Training

Behavior problems are often a factor when people relinquish pets. These problems can most often be resolved with understanding and training. Many people are unable to travel across town for help, but assistance may be closer than they think.

Aversive (punishment) training has no place in modifying behavior.

Reward-based training does not endorse the use of chain, prong or electric collars.

Ask the provider if they offer discounts for dogs adopted from a rescue or shelter.

Please support the Rescue Rally!

A recent survey of area animal shelters by a University student reported that the cost to the Marion County taxpayer for the intake and disposition of a dog or cat who enters Indianapolis Animal Care and Control is approximately \$225. In 2010, IACC received 16,666 animals. IACC officials report that approximately 45% of the animals leave alive. That means that 55% (9,000) of the animals leave the shelter dead. Studies indicate that 90% of animals destroyed in municipal shelters are adoptable.

The math tells us that Indianapolis city officials are allocating \$1.8 million in Marion County taxpayer dollars to kill cats and dogs in our "world class city." Apparently money can't be found to fund adequate staffing, off-site adoption venues, a full-time vet and upgrading the HVAC system at IACC to standard code. Yet city officials seem to find plenty of funding to remodel the public safety director's office and support and promote the city's sports industry.

There is no benefit waiting for elected officials to develop a conscience and re-evaluate spending misallocations. We hope you'll consider a donation to support the Rescue Rally through **move to ACT**. The Rally recognizes and rewards small, local rescue organizations that pull animals from IACC. These are the selfless "heavy-lifters" who work tirelessly to get as many animals as possible out of IACC alive. They are all-volunteer organizations that have no salaried development directors or public relations personnel — yet they work tirelessly to assist the staff and animals at an agency that Indianapolis city leadership has shamelessly abandoned.
